# National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Grant

- Maximum award amount \$150,000
- Period of performance Up to two years
- Expected notification date December 31, 2024
- No matching funds required

## **Cultural and Community Resilience**

The Cultural and Community Resilience program supports community-based efforts to address the impacts of climate change and COVID-19 by safeguarding cultural resources and fostering cultural resilience through identifying, documenting, and/or collecting cultural heritage and community experiences. The program prioritizes projects from disadvantaged communities in the United States or its jurisdictions.

Projects should fall into one of two categories: community collecting initiatives or oral history programs. All projects must address the impacts of either climate change or the COVID-19 pandemic on one or more communities. The program welcomes both modest projects and larger ones and supports projects at any stage, from preliminary planning to final steps and implementation.

Project activities may take many forms, including but not limited to:

- Collaborative planning to identify cultural and historical resources;
- Documentation of cultural and historical resources through digital means;
- Recording oral histories;
- Preserving Traditional Knowledge, practices, or technologies, and memories of elders and community, including in languages other than English; or
- Establishing shared resources and protocols for rapid response collecting.

NEH welcomes applications at all stages of project development and encourages the use of inclusive methodologies. These might include folkloric, ethnohistorical, and ethnographic modes of inquiry; oral histories; participatory archiving; shared stewardship arrangements; and community-centered access. NEH also encourages leveraging open access online resources and using Creative Commons licenses, when possible and as appropriate.

## Town Proposal

- Projected budget \$80,000
- Grant Administrator Devan Aziz

This project will be a partnership with the Town and the Palisade Historical Society. The project will document the impact of climate change on our agricultural community through oral histories and archival preservation including the potential impact on the Palisade watershed. The Historical Society will record interviews with local farmers and migrant workers about their experiences with extreme weather events, particularly freezes, and how they have adapted their practices. Additionally, the Historical Society will archive historical materials related to past agricultural & watershed management practices. This project will not only preserve valuable cultural heritage but also provide insights into building resilience for a future marked by climate fluctuations. The collected materials will be accessible online and through educational programming, fostering public understanding of the human dimensions of climate change and its impact on local food and water security.

## Climate Change Threats to Palisade's Cultural Identity

Agriculture: Palisade's renowned peaches and other fruits are particularly vulnerable to climate change. Rising temperatures can lead to earlier springs, increasing the risk of frost damage to delicate blossoms. Warmer summers can create ideal conditions for pests and diseases, requiring increased use of pesticides that threaten the health of the ecosystem. Additionally, changes in precipitation patterns, with less rain and more intense storms, could disrupt irrigation practices and lead to water scarcity or crop failure, impacting yields.

Watershed Management: Climate change can significantly affect precipitation patterns, which plays a vital role in Palisade's agricultural practices. Decreased snowpack and earlier snowmelt could lead to reduced water flow during the critical summer months, making it difficult for farmers to maintain healthy crop yields and keep an adequate water supply for the town. Conversely, more intense storms could cause mud and rockslides, eroding topsoil and damaging infrastructure. These changes in water availability and flow threaten the sustainability of Palisade's agricultural way of life.

## **Desired Collaboration**

Collaborating with Colorado Mesa University can help explore ways to build cultural resilience and collect data. The project could investigate traditional agricultural practices that might be more adaptable to changing conditions or explore innovative water management solutions that ensure the longevity of Palisade's watershed infrastructure.
